
# Pregnancy Center State Impact Report - 2022 Data

#### Finding Hope in California

Athziri already had three small children when she discovered that she was unexpectedly pregnant again. "At this moment in my life, me and my husband just started doing full-time ministry on the road," she explained. "We were basically living by faith, so this was hard."

Because she didn't think she could do this again, she contacted an abortion center. "I tried to convince myself that taking an abortion pill was almost like having a natural miscarriage." The reality of what she had done soon hit her after she took that first pill. She hadn't told her husband at this point that she was pregnant or that she took the abortion drug, but she told him he needed to take her to the hospital right away. Because the hospital knew so little about the abortion drug, they sent her home.

Thankfully, on the way home she saw a billboard with a number to call for abortion pill reversal. "They connected me to Pregnancy Care Center in Fresno," Athziri shared. When she went in and talked to the staff, she felt relieved. After a few weeks of progesterone and an ultrasound, her pregnancy was confirmed to be progressing as normal. She went on to give birth to her son, David. "When I look at his smile, I think, 'I could have possibly not had this, and I wouldn't even know what I was missing out on." Thankful for the work of Pregnancy Care Center, Athziri said, "It's nice to know that God made a way for me to still have David and not regret things. I get to see David, hold him, and he gets to be in my life."

- The California mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$34.77 per hour BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$66.20 per hour OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$58.97 per hour OES code 29-2032.
   The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance
- provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
