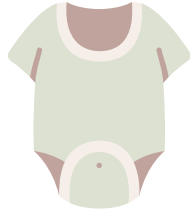

### Finding Hope in New York

During Marilyn's first pregnancy, she had an abortion. She reflects, "I had my first abortion in Planned Parenthood. When I went there, I did feel a sense of shame, scariness. It wasn't like I had special care after I had my first abortion. I had to care for myself afterward, and it was just not a great experience being in Planned Parenthood."

After a bit of time, Marilyn found herself pregnant and scared again. This time, she knew what she did not want to do: "I knew for a fact that I didn't want to go back to Planned Parenthood just because of the first time that I went and the experience." An internet search brought up Soundview Pregnancy Services, and she scheduled an appointment. "I met with a really nice nurse and she took me right into the room to confirm my pregnancy. I'll never forget how she made a big impact in my decision," she explained.

Marilyn continued going to Soundview Pregnancy Services throughout her pregnancy. When reflecting on this time, she shares, "I honestly could have never done this all by myself. I felt supported. I felt welcomed. I felt a sense of relief. I didn't have to pay anything. It wasn't all about the money, it was about just having support. After these couple of months, towards the end, they threw me a baby shower with people that are very nice." Marilyn shares in appreciation of Soundview Pregnancy Services, "I couldn't have done this by myself, and I am so happy that I sought help and that they helped me throughout this journey."\* She now has a beautiful son.

#### NOTES:

- This report is a collaborative project between Charlotte Lozier Institute (CLI) and Care Net. We are grateful to Heartbeat International and the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates for their contributions towards data collection from their affiliated U.S. pregnancy centers.
- Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 84 pregnancy centers in the state of New York in calendar year 2022. None of the centers reporting data received state or federal funding in 2022.
- Total savings are calculated based on cost estimates of services, classes and baby items provided to clients. The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section, pgs. 15-16, of the 2022 CLI national pregnancy center report, "Hope for A New Generation" (<https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/>), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The New York mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$39.21 per hour - BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$51.26 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$45.28 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
