

Finding Hope in Missouri

When Faith found out she was pregnant, a friend introduced her to Alpha House, a pregnancy medical center. She was able to go to Alpha House to have an ultrasound. She soon discovered that she was carrying twins!

Her first reaction upon discovering she was pregnant was, "This is a light at the end of a dark tunnel." It was the catalyst she needed to end her addiction to drugs. Having a baby gave her a reason to walk away from that life and begin a new one.

Faith continued going to Alpha House for ongoing prenatal education and material services. She shares that courses at Alpha House really taught her everything she knows about pregnancy and parenting. Meeting every week with her mentor helped her mentally, physically, and emotionally as she overcame each new hurdle related to having two babies at once.

Being able to talk through what to do and how to care for her babies with her mentor is what she enjoyed most. Going through the Mother's Journey Devotionals has helped her learn to be patient. Faith states about this time, "I am learning to trust God to make things happen in His time frame."

She felt like Alpha House helped her financially because of the material assistance she received with diapers, wipes, crib mattresses, and more through their Blessing Beyond Program. When it came time for her to get her own apartment, Alpha House also helped her with her deposit. "I will always be thankful to all the donors who answered the call for furniture and household items when I moved," she says. Faith tells everyone she knows who might be pregnant not to worry. "If you don't know what to do, go to Alpha House. They will help you every step of the way."

The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section, pgs. 15-16, of the 2022 CLI national pregnancy center report, "Hope for A New Generation" (https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The Missouri mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$28.35 per hour BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$37.30 per hour OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$41.30 per hour OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance
 provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with
 hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around
 the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the
 women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
