

### Finding Hope in Tennessee

When Raven discovered she was pregnant, others suggested only adoption or abortion. Thankfully, Portico pregnancy resource center gave her hope to parent and raise her daughter as she desired. In what follows, she shares her story in her own words.

"[It] had been suggested to have an abortion by several people. [It] had been suggested to even put her up for adoption and [I was] told that I wouldn't be able to give her the life that she deserved. Portico was honestly the only place that gave me any kind of hope. As soon as the 'adoption' or 'abortion' words were brought up, [Portico] knew I was not okay with that, and they were so on board and so supportive of me not doing that. That was the first time that I had experienced that, and I felt a general sense of hope about the situation in its entirety."

The professional medical care, ongoing prenatal education, and material services provided at the pregnancy medical center during and after her pregnancy gave Raven the confidence to know that she would be a great mom. Raven recalls, "'People are telling me, 'You're not going to be capable of being a great mom.' I'm saying, 'There's a place where I can go and they're actually encouraging me and telling me I can be.' I look around at the crib, the car seat, her clothes, everything came from Portico."

"Everything that Portico has done for us has been life-changing, truly," Raven shares in appreciation. "I was going through a lot of stuff in my personal life and this just was a safe place for me where I could come and be open and honest about where I was at in my life." Raven now has a beautiful daughter.
