Finding Hope in New Mexico

Yi and Bing felt helpless when they learned of being pregnant for the first time. This is when Yi found Care Net Pregnancy Center of Albuquerque's website. After seeing all the resources they listed, the couple decided to schedule an appointment.

When they first arrived at Care Net, Yi felt comfortable, like it was home. Already four months pregnant, Yi received a pregnancy test and her first ultrasound. She states, "We could not only see our baby [Charlene], but also hear the heartbeat. That was really special." Afterwards, the caring staff shared the Earn While You Learn program, where the family learned what to expect as new parents and started earning diapers, wipes, and more needed for Charlene's arrival.

Bing was also introduced to the Dr. Dad program, which teaches men the skills necessary to care for mom throughout pregnancy and the baby after birth. When asked of his interest in Dr. Dad, Bing said, "I wanted to change my role from son to dad. From husband to dad." Both parents would "100% recommend Care Net" to anyone needing help during pregnancy, as these much-needed resources can help answer any doubts parents may have.

Bing shares what this time at Care Net Pregnancy Center of Albuquerque means to him: "I'm writing to express my heartfelt gratitude for the outstanding care and support you provided to my wife and baby. Your kindness, patience, and professionalism truly made a world of difference during a time when I needed the help the most. Becoming a new parent is often challenging, especially with the first baby. It was such a relief to know that my wife and baby were in your capable and caring hands. Your attentiveness and dedication were evident in every interaction from the way you manage their needs to the warmth and compassion you consistently showed. This brought me immense peace of mind for which I am deeply, deeply grateful."

 Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 23 pregnancy centers in the state of NM in calendar year 2022. At least 1 center reporting data received state or federal funding in 2022.

The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section, pgs. 15-16, of the 2022 CLI national pregnancy center report, "Hope for A New Generation" (https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The New Mexico mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$33.12 per hour BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$44.30 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$37.75 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
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
