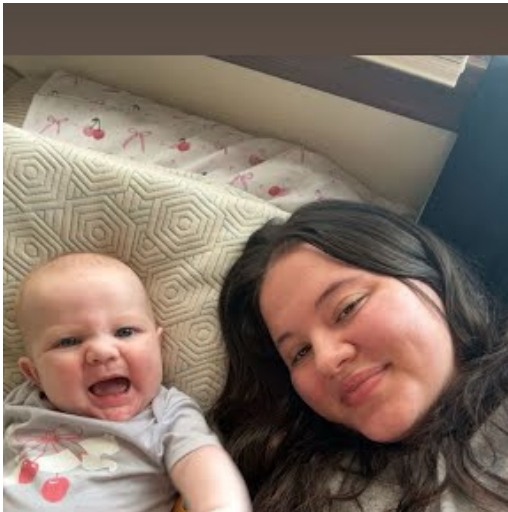

Finding Hope in Ohio

When Sydney was 20, an at-home pregnancy test indicated she was pregnant. She sought assistance from HerChoice pregnancy center for this unplanned pregnancy and describes the experience in her own words below.

"My journey began when I discovered I was pregnant at the age of 20. What I thought was food poisoning after a family vacation turned out to be something entirely different. The initial shock brought on a mix of tears, laughter, and a bit of nausea - it was certainly an experience!

"Once I pulled myself together, I called the HerChoice center. From that first phone call, I was met with kindness, positivity, and an empathy that truly made a difference when I felt like my world was falling apart. They confirmed my pregnancy, and then invited me back with my partner to discuss our options and navigate this new information. It was at HerChoice that I first saw my Opal Jo during my first sonogram. To be surrounded by people who were so understanding made me realize that maybe, just maybe, everything was going to be okay. They provided invaluable information about their birth and parenting classes, and I accepted their help without hesitation - I honestly had no idea what else I was going to do.

"The leader of my classes was Leigh, and I can honestly say I wouldn't be standing here today if it wasn't for her. Every Tuesday at 11 a.m., I looked forward to our weekly meetings. We talked about everything - how I was feeling (those first 20 weeks were rough), how I was managing school as a full-time college junior, and how work was going, as I also worked full-time. Leigh never made it just about the baby; she made me feel seen and supported as an individual.

"Almost everything I've been able to provide for my little girl has come from the center. Thanks to my hard work earning points, I haven't had to buy diapers yet! The first people I wanted to introduce my baby to were Leigh and all the other amazing women who make HerChoice what it is: a welcoming, supportive, empathetic, and truly incredible place.

"Your contributions and dedication have made a profound impact on my life and the life of my daughter. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart, for everything."

- We are grateful to Care Net, Heartbeat International and the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates for their contributions towards data collection from their affiliated U.S. pregnancy centers.
- Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 155 pregnancy centers in the state of OH in calendar year 2024. At least 32 of the centers reporting data received state or federal funding in 2024.
- Total savings are calculated based on cost estimates of services, classes and baby items provided to clients. The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section of the 2024 CLI national pregnancy center report, "Pregnancy Centers: Rising to the Occasion with Unwavering Care" (<https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/>), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The Ohio mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$32.26 per hour - BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$41.40 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$39.40 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
