Finding Hope in Virginia

Bela was in a relationship when she learned she was pregnant. She shared: "I knew immediately that I was going to keep the baby, but it wasn't all about me and what I wanted. He was not so thrilled about the child." Bela's story in her own words tells of continued pressure by the father to abort their baby and her strength of conviction coupled with the ongoing support she received to choose life for her daughter.

"His stance remained the same—that he didn't want me to go through with my pregnancy even well into my second trimester, third trimester when I was like, 'It is way too late to get an abortion now, I don't know why we are still having this conversation.' He still pushed for me to abort her. I almost felt selfish for wanting to keep her because he was wanting to abort her so bad. I knew deep down if I did choose to have an abortion, I would never forgive myself for it."

Bela visited Alcove Health Women's Clinic, where she received support and had an ultrasound. She shared: "In that first ultrasound and actually seeing like, wow, I am pregnant. There is a baby in there. It is definitely a life-changing moment."

"My experience with my OB-Gyn - I always felt like I was kind of like a number to them. Whereas, when I went to Alcove I left like my personal situation actually mattered. My mom, of course, was a great ally to me. I also felt like throughout my pregnancy Alcove was an ally. In doing the learning videos, I felt like I can do this. I can have a baby and I can be a mom. Throughout my pregnancy, Alcove provided me with maternity clothes, which was awesome. And with the layette they provided, it was above and beyond what I expected, honestly. It had so many baby items, and stuff for me."

Of her daughter Cora, Bela shares: "I feel like I was meant to be her mom my whole life. I'm so grateful that I did decide to keep her and that I'm her mom."

- Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 50 pregnancy centers in the state of VA in calendar year 2024. At least 2 of the centers reporting data received state or federal funding in 2024.
- Total savings are calculated based on cost estimates of services, classes and baby items provided to clients. - The Virginia mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$39.24 per hour - BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$43.72 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$43.05 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
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
