Finding Hope in Pennsylvania

After taking multiple pregnancy tests and receiving conflicting results, Sarah* wanted to find better answers. She googled help and found the Alpha Omega Center— and was surprised at just how quickly she was scheduled and just how welcome she felt upon arriving at her first appointment. Remembering that first appointment, Sarah shares: “I’ve never been to an office where I felt like the least amount of judgment ever, and it was just really comforting and welcoming.” Although Sarah felt safe at Alpha Omega Center, she still had worries about being pregnant. “I wasn’t really ready to have another baby. My older two are much older, and then I have a seven-year-old, so there’s big age gaps,” she recalls.

At that appointment, she received a pregnancy packet that included information about her options. She also received referrals for local OBGYNs, WIC, Medicaid, and other local agencies that could assist her.

The prior conflicting results made the ultrasound at her appointment that much more impactful for Sarah. It provided a clear image of this new little one, which Sarah needed, helping her to know that this pregnancy was very real. The care from the Alpha Omega Center staff put her at ease and offered her the support she needed to move forward. She left that day with prenatal vitamins, a Bible, and more comfortable about what lay ahead.

The Alpha Omega Center provided care for Sarah as she walked through the pregnancy and never once asked for any payment or insurance to be provided. Sarah mentions that this lifted a burden off of her because she was struggling financially at the time as well. At every appointment, she felt welcomed in a way that she knew she wouldn’t have been at a doctor’s office, and she appreciated the time taken at each appointment, as well as the follow-up communications the office made with her even after her baby was born.

Sarah says, “Visiting the Alpha [Omega] Center was completely worry-free...and made me feel more secure.” She says that she would recommend that any woman who is unsure about her pregnancy should seek out this center for help.

- We are grateful to Care Net, Heartbeat International, and the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates for their contributions towards data collection from their affiliated U.S. pregnancy centers.
- Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 130 pregnancy centers in the state of Pennsylvania in calendar year 2024. At least 6 of the centers reporting data received state or federal funding in 2024.
- Total savings are calculated based on cost estimates of services, classes and baby items provided to clients. The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section of the 2024 CLI national pregnancy center report, “Pregnancy Centers: Rising to the Occasion with Unwavering Care” (<https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/>), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The Pennsylvania mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$34.07 per hour - BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$43.67 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$39.36 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
