Finding Hope in California

"When I first found out I was pregnant, it didn't feel real, I had no thoughts of becoming a mom. I took a pregnancy test [at home] and I saw that it said positive and I still couldn't believe it. I took another one and it said positive again. There was a moment when I felt hopeless, and I kept crying because I didn't think I was able to be a good mom. I went online to schedule an abortion, but by God's grace, I found Sierra Pregnancy and Health and made an appointment.

Before I was even asked to take a pregnancy test I was asked how I was doing. During my clinic visit my advocate, Nikki, made me feel so comfortable and heard, I still wanted to get an abortion, but I didn't feel judged. I told her that I felt like I didn't have anybody. I went home and cried because I felt like a lost cause. I was so overwhelmed. I kept telling myself there's no way you can get through this, you will not be a good mom. But when I went back to the clinic for my ultrasound, that heartbeat was my first glimmer of hope.

The SPH team gave me so many helpful resources: pregnancy and parenting education sessions, material resources including diapers and wipes, nurse-taught classes on labor and delivery, and more. I also learned about Embrace Grace church groups, and joining that community has meant so much to me. I had no expectations whatsoever. I just knew that I wanted to be around women experiencing what I was experiencing. They kept talking about how much God loves us. Hearing about all the people who were praying for us meant so much to me. I felt hope, like I could heal and find strength. I started going to church, opening my Bible, and really accepting God's love. My baby girl was born, and I wouldn't trade her for anything in the world. We love her to pieces. Being a mom has been so rewarding. I feel so blessed that my baby is here and she's healthy. I know I couldn't have done this without a place like Sierra Pregnancy and Health."

- We are grateful to Care Net, Heartbeat International, and the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates for their contributions towards data collection from their affiliated U.S. pregnancy centers.
- Value of services is based upon materials and services provided by 168 pregnancy centers in the state of California in calendar year 2024. At least four of the centers reporting data received state or federal funding in 2024.
- Total savings are calculated based on cost estimates of services, classes and baby items provided to clients. The sources for the cost estimates and valuation of items and services can be found in the Methodology section of the 2024 CLI national pregnancy center report, "Pregnancy Centers: Rising to the Occasion with Unwavering Care" (<https://lozierinstitute.org/pcr/>), except for the following state-specific labor costs.
- The California mean hourly wages referenced are as follows: Social Workers in local/state government is \$36.20 per hour - BLS OES code 21-1029, Registered Nurses is \$72.25 per hour - OES code 29-1141, and Diagnostic Medical Sonographers is \$60.87 per hour - OES code 29-2032.
- The estimated savings does not include housing and other monetary assistance provided to some clients. We advocate for our clients by networking with hundreds of county, state and non-profit social service organizations around the country. We cannot quantify the value of emotional support given to the women we help through phone calls and caring volunteers.
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
