Figure 1 – Abortion Providers Operating In and Outside of the Formal Healthcare System, with Updated Totals

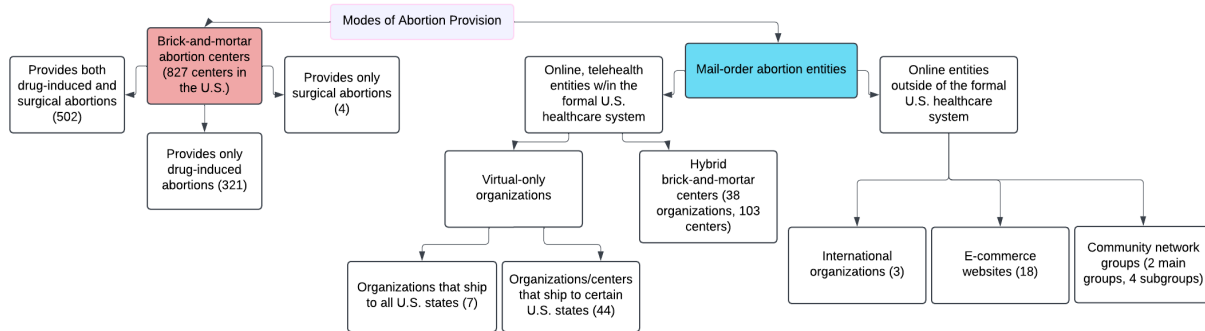

***=** Colorado doesn't have a statutory requirement mandating the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) publish annual, aggregated abortion data collected by the state. However, for the years 2017-2023, the CDPHE had been providing CLI with aggregate data upon request. In 2025, when CLI requested the state's 2024 abortion data, the CDPHE let CLI know that due to the passage of [SB 25-129](#) into law in April 2025, they wouldn't be sharing abortion data with anyone while the Department's legal guidance determined the effect of the legislation on sharing such data. However, when CLI emailed the CDPHE in June 2026 to see if the Department was tracking mail-order abortions shipped within the state and from out of state, as the state is still requiring that abortion facilities notify the department of any abortions performed at their facility, the CDPHE said the Department tracks both types of mail-order abortions (even though the aggregate data can't be shared with the public).

#= Delaware's most recent abortion data was published in 2025 and contains data on abortions performed in the state in 2022. Because the #WeCount project doesn't report a full year's worth of 2022 data, CLI didn't compare the two organizations' abortion totals for Delaware.

&= [On July 1, 2026](#), Iowa's [HF 2788](#) legislation went into effect. This legislation prohibits prescribers licensed in Iowa from performing telehealth abortions in the state. Because of this, CLI has marked Iowa as 'NA' in terms of the state tracking mail-order abortions being prescribed within the state.

^= Massachusetts is the only state whose abortion total is greater than #WeCount's.

+ = Missouri, North Carolina, and Wisconsin's latest abortion data is from 2023. Abortion was prohibited in Missouri except in limited cases for all of 2023, so any abortions tracked by #WeCount were mail-order abortion drugs shipped into the state by prescribers licensed in other states utilizing shield laws. Until July 1, 2023, North Carolina allowed abortion until 20 weeks of gestation. On July 1, 2023, abortion became restricted in the state after 12 weeks of gestation. #WeCount didn't start tracking shield law abortions until July 2023, so Missouri, North Carolina, and Wisconsin's 2023 abortion totals are undercounts. Wisconsin prohibited abortions except in limited cases until September 2023, so until that time, a majority of the abortions occurring from January until September were also occurring via shield laws.

Figure 4 – Percent of Abortions by Type of Abortion Provider within the Formal U.S. Healthcare System, July 2023 - December 2025

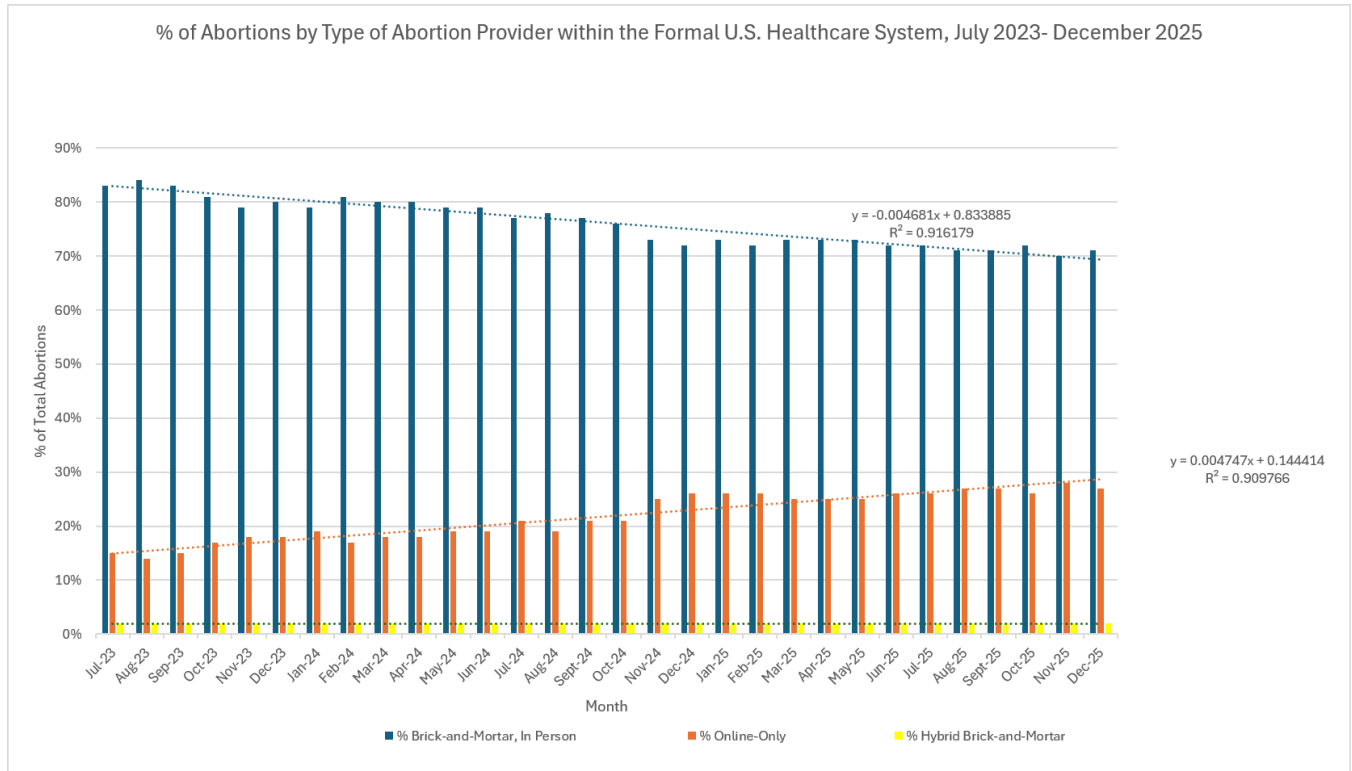


Figure 5 – Approximate Calculations for When Online-Only Abortions Will Occur at the Same Rate as Brick-and-Mortar Abortions in the Formal U.S. Healthcare System

Projected date the % of o. o. abortions will equal the % of b. m. abortions (of intersection)
